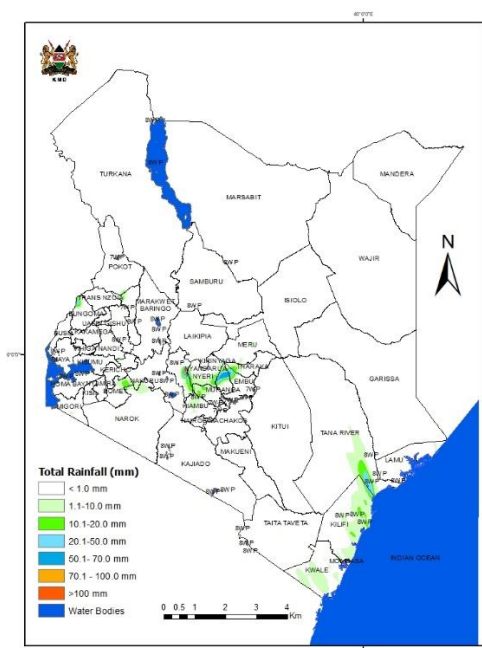
WEEKLY BIOMETEOROLOGICAL BULLETIN FOR 8TH – 14TH SEPT 2026

SUMMARY

Sunny and dry conditions with warmer than normal temperatures will dominate over most parts of the country. Maximum temperatures exceeding 30°C are expected over Wajir, Garissa, Mandera, West Pokot, Turkana, Isiolo, Baringo, Samburu, Kisumu, Homabay, Bungoma, Siaya, Busia, West Pokot, Migori, Makueni and Taita Taveta Counties increasing the risk of respiratory illnesses, heat related illnesses, sunburn, malnutrition and visceral leishmaniasis in arid areas.

1.0 FORECAST FOR 8TH – 14TH SEPT 2026 AND IMPACTS ON HEALTH

1.1 RAINFALL FORECAST



Most parts of the country will remain dry and sunny.

Occasional light Showers and thunderstorms are expected over isolated-few parts of Bungoma, Kericho, Elgeiyo Marakwet, and Bomet Counties.

Occasional Isolated light rains over few places are expected in Nyeri, Kirinyaga, Murang'a, Kiambu, Embu, Meru, Tharaka Nithi and Nyandarua Counties.

Isolated light showers are expected over few parts of Kilifi, Mombasa, Kwale, Kwale and Coastal parts of Tana River Counties.

Total weekly rainfall exceeding 50 mm is not expected in any County as shown in Figure 1.

Impacts on Health

During the forecast period, low risk of flooding is expected over the Counties likely to receive rainfall, with a moderate risk of vector-borne diseases such as malaria, chikungunya and dengue. There is low risk of Rift Valley fever in susceptible regions, while the risk of waterborne diseases and anthrax outbreaks remain low. The generally reduced rainfall and limited flooding conditions will lead to no disruption of health services with very low risk of drowning.

Advisory

To reduce health risks during the rainy period, communities are advised to sleep under treated mosquito nets and eliminate stagnant water, use safe drinking water, wear gumboots and avoid walking bare feet in wet areas. Vaccinate livestock against anthrax and Rift Valley fever, avoid consuming meat from animals that die suddenly and instead buy inspected meat from licensed butchers and prevent accidents by avoiding flooded or landslide-prone areas and not sheltering under trees during rainfall.

1.2 TEMPERATURE FORECAST

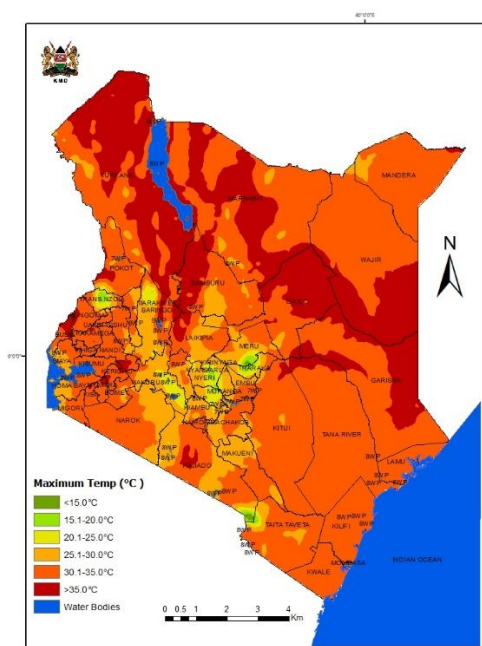


Figure 2: Forecasted average maximum temperature for 8th – 14th Sept 2026

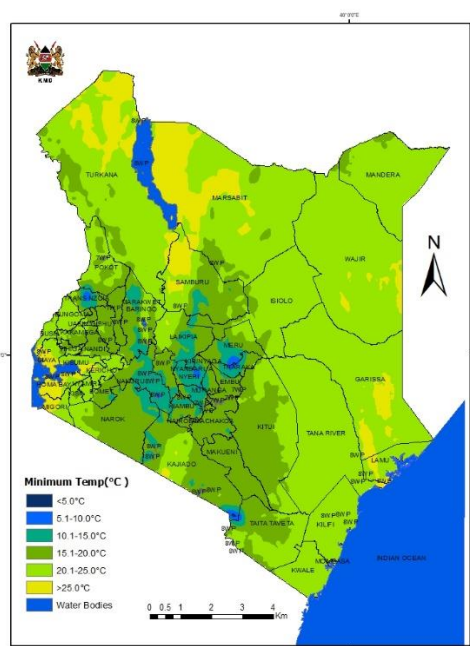


Figure 3: Forecasted average minimum temperature for 8th – 14th Sept 2026

Maximum temperatures in most parts of the country are expected to be warmer than the maximum temperatures as usually observed during this period. The average maximum temperatures will exceed 30°C, over Wajir, Garissa, Mandera, West Pokot, Turkana, Isiolo, Baringo, Samburu, Kisumu, Homabay, Bungoma, Siaya, Busia, West Pokot, Migori, Makueni and Taita Taveta Counties during the forecast period as shown in Figure 2 above. Minimum temperatures are expected to be lower than normal in Tharaka Nithi, Meru, Kericho, Laikipia, Nairobi, Kirinyaga, Kiambu, Narok Machakos, Bomet, Kitale, Nyeri, Kajiado and Narok with temperatures less than 10°C expected over Nyandarua County during the forecast period as shown in Figure 3 above.

Impacts on Health and Advisory

The sunny and dry conditions with warmer than normal maximum temperatures over most parts of the country are increasing the risk of respiratory illnesses, heat related illnesses, sunburn, malnutrition and visceral leishmaniasis especially in arid areas. There is also a moderate risk of cardiovascular complications, particularly affecting children, the elderly and individuals with pre-existing chronic illnesses in areas expected over areas that will experience low minimum temperatures. Vulnerable groups remain at higher risk of severe health impacts during the forecast period. During extreme heat; drink water regularly, wear light clothes, avoid alcohol and too much caffeine, wear a cap and sunglasses. In cold weather; dress warmly and limit exposure to cold, especially for the vulnerable populations.

1.3 STRONG WINDS



Strong southerly to south-easterly winds with speeds exceeding 25 knots (12.9m/s) are expected to prevail over parts of Marsabit, Meru, Garissa, Isiolo, North of Turkana, Taita Taveta, and Tana River Counties.

Impacts on Health and Advisory

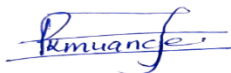
There is a high risk of increased respiratory illnesses and asthma due to dust carried by strong winds, increased eye sensitivity especially among older people and possible property destruction as well as disruption of health care services in some areas. The health advisory is; limit outdoor exposure and wear a mask when it is dusty.

2.0 REVIEW FOR PREVIOUS WEEK (31ST AUG – 6TH SEPT 2026)

In the last one week, weather conditions were dominantly sunny and dry in most parts of the Country. No Station recorded cumulative rainfall above 50mm. Stations that recorded average weekly maximum temperatures exceeding 30°C during the forecast period included Mandera (37.1°C), Lodwar (36.4°C), Garissa (34.3°C), Wajir (34.0°C), Kisumu (32.8°C) and Kakamega (31.3°C). During the reporting period, Nyahururu station recorded 7-day average minimum temperatures below 10°C, notably (6.8°C). Strong winds of 25 knots and above were observed over parts of the country, particularly at Marsabit station, during the reporting period.

N.B: Persons are encouraged to take proactive measures to safeguard their lives and communities against the anticipated weather conditions.
